
Through the generosity and dedication of our donors, partners, volunteers and staff, Food For The Poor Canada has grown steadily over the past decade.



BUILDING A LEGACY VILLAGES



In 2018, with the extraordinary philanthropic partnership of Laura McCain, we completed our first village in Haiti, Bezin, complete with 30 homes, community water, electric light, and a chicken farm with 1000 layers to support nutrition and livelihood for the families there. With Laura's continued generosity and trust in our ability to transform communities, we started on our second village in late 2018 and continue to build in Tierra Muscady, Haiti.

“For the first time in my life” said Rose Marie Lundor, who works at the chicken coop, **“I feel useful to the community. This project is a great initiative and a wonderful opportunity for the area. I thank FFP and the donors for this great gift.”**

“Now that I have a nice house” said Marie Nicole Maisonneuve, proud recipient of a new home **“I feel safe. I can lock my door at night. And as a family we can sit together, pray and peacefully go to bed. We also pray for the donors who paid for our home so that they can continue to help those who are living in poverty.”**

Our campaign “It takes a village to build a village” to build our third village in Haiti, Derac, began in the fall. We ask for your continued support in this effort.

BUILDING A LEGACY

EDUCATION



In 2018 we built three schools in Jamaica. Together with you we have now built 30 schools in total supporting 1500 students each year.

In April our first group of Food For The Poor volunteers, passionate about education, built Hampden Infant school. The Carpenter's Union Local 27 in collaboration with Helping Hands Jamaica Foundation (HHJF) followed them in June and working with Jamaican contractors, built Wakefield Infant school.

In July, HHJF built their 19th school with us in Portland, Mount Pleasant Basic School. Each of these groups has left a legacy in the community they worked in.

We worked with ICHS, an all girls government high school in Jamaica, to support their new Food and Nutrition lab by helping them procure 10 kitchen work stations. This lab will give girls the opportunity to learn about the science of food and nutrition in a state of the art setting.

HEALTH



Access to food, clean water, medicines and safe housing will improve a child's short term and long term health; a lack of any of these basic needs increases the risk of poor long term health.

In 2018, our partner HPIC donated \$8 million worth of medicines and medical supplies to FFPC. You provided the funds to warehouse, ship and distribute these life saving items to hospitals and clinics in Haiti and Jamaica.

We help provide food, educational supplies, school furniture, medicines and medical supplies to Food For The Poor Jamaica and Haiti. In turn, they distribute those goods to schools, orphanages, churches, hospitals, and community leaders that work directly with people and communities in need.

We partnered with F.I.S.H., a Jamaican public health clinic to provide a Leika microscope to help treat patients' eyes in Jamaica. You are changing lives by allowing people to see, so that they can work, go to school, and live healthier, more productive lives.

You may never know whose life you have saved or changed, but you can be certain that your legacy is transformational.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE & PREPAREDNESS

In October 2018, Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit of Dominica, joined us at our annual fundraiser to thank our donors for the emergency response to Hurricane Irma in 2017. He thanked FFP for its international response as well as Canada's support which helped rebuild homes in Dominica.

Food For The Poor's strength in emergency response and preparedness is enabled by its partnerships in the countries it supports 365 days of the year with ongoing development and aid. In an emergency, our partners are set up to effectively and efficiently distribute life saving emergency supplies.

Our strength lies in our partners on the ground and our partners in Canada. In 2018 we partnered with Scotiabank to purchase 4 million water purification tablets. This will allow FFPC to prepare for an emergency or a natural disaster, responding to a need for clean water in the Caribbean or Latin America at a moments notice.
